

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The Chief Rabbi's Rosh Hashanah Message 5786

Broken and exhausted,

he begged his brother to

few months ago, while recording some podcasts in Israel, I interviewed hostage campaigner Dalia Horn. Her family's pain is unimaginable: her brothers-in-law, Yair and Eitan, were both taken hostage by Hamas on October 7th. Yair, who was released after nearly five hundred days of unspeakable torture, shared a story with Dalia which she recalled during our conversation.

At one point during their captivity, the two brothers were forced to run for their lives through a tunnel deep beneath Gaza. Eitan collapsed. Broken and exhausted, he begged his brother to leave him behind. But Yair refused. He bent down and lifted him up, with two Hebrew words: "Achim anachnu" -"We are brothers".

After his release, Yair asked Dalia, "Who will be there to lift Eitan now, when I no longer can?"

Dalia's answer became her mission, and her message to the Jewish world: We are all brothers and sisters. And it is our responsibility to lift one another.

On the second day of Rosh Hashanah, we read the story of the Akeidah - the binding of Isaac. In its aftermath, Hashem famously blesses Abraham: "I shall significantly increase the number of your offspring so they will be like the stars in the heavens above and like the sand which is by the seashore."

The Midrash asks: why both stars and sand? Both seem to symbolise incalculability - so what is the difference?

The answer is that stars are high, untouchable and secure. They represent the Jewish people in

> times of safety and strength. But sand is trampled underfoot. It symbolises us in our moments of danger, pain and vulnerability. And yet, this is part of a blessing. How so?

leave him behind. But Yair refused. He bent down and lifted him up, with two Hebrew words: "Achim anachnu" - "We are brothers". Because the reference here is

not merely to "sand". It is "sand by the seashore". Wet, compact and pressed tightly together by the tide, the individual grains are bound together as one.

This was Hashem's deeper blessing: that even when we

are under assault, when we feel trampled or cast aside, we will not scatter. We will draw together. We will hold each other up.

We have felt the loneliness of facing down hatred, and the weight of grief and fear. And yet, like the sand on the shore, we have held firm, bound together by a heritage that is ancient, unshakable and sacred.



From the Rabbi In the Footsteps of Giants

ho are the heroes of our Torah Readings on Rosh Hashana?

Well, there's Abraham - the first Jew. His son Isaac - the first person actually born Jewish. We read of his birth on the first day of the festival and his near death on the second in the episode known as the Akeida: when Abraham was prepared to listen to G-d even though it would mean losing his precious child. Listening to G-d is very important in our religion!

But what about the women? Well, there's Abraham's wife Sarah. She was so special the G-d told Abraham 'whatever Sarah tells you; listen to her voice'. You really can't do much better than that! Or maybe you can. How about someone that G-d Himself listened to?

That was Hannah, the childless woman whose prayers were answered by the Almighty, Who granted her the son she desired so much.

These are all heroes and heroines of our people, who formed our nation physically and spiritually. We learn faith, devotion and self-sacrifice from Abraham and Isaac. The importance of maternal instincts and parental dedication from Sarah. And the power of prayer from Hannah.

We read about this on Rosh Hashana but what do these giants of our Rosh Hashana narrative teach us? What is their lesson as we listen to the Shofar, stand before Hashem in prayer and contemplate a new year?

During one of the Chief Rabbi's visits here I remarked to him that he has had a very challenging period as Chief Rabbi. Brexit, Covid, the death of the Queen, October 7th and its aftermath. His response was 'yes...and Jeremy Corbyn!'

Over the last decade we have certainly lived through 'interesting times'. For many Jews there is a genuine feeling of fear and isolation. Some six or seven years ago I attended a meeting of a Jewish Labour group in Middle Street synagogue at which one speaker after another, some in tears, stood up and lamented that this was not the same party they had joined. I hope things have improved since then.

But whatever we have gone through recently, our people have endured before and, tragically, a lot worse. We have endured, survived and subsequently flourished. We have not been able to rely on governments. of any political stripe. Rather the faith. devotion, survival instinct and prayers inherited from our ancestors have seen us through year after challenging year.

So, as we stand before G-d this Rosh Hashana, let us resolve to emulate the formers of our heritage. To strengthen our Jewishness in the coming year and put our faith into practice.

Rabbi Rader has run very successful lecture evenings and has an exciting programme for the coming months. Some thirty people attended his last two courses. A new course running from August 21st to September 18th 2025 will be "Responses to questions on Kabbala Shul Service and upcoming High Festival Services" and November 16th to December 15th will be "High Points in Jewish History – An overview of 4000 years of our people".

It is not perhaps appreciated that Rabbi has a daily Shuir after the morning service, and a pre-service shiur on Shabbat morning, as well as being available to individuals who wish to study. Any one who wishes to learn a Torah Portion is welcomed by Rabbi. The mikvah is well used and I wish to record my thanks to Mrs. Perla Rader who has quietly and discreetly organized its use. She has also generously given her time to so many activities, and the lunch and learn group on Wednesdays enjoys her homemade soups.

Friday evening dinners have been well attended and most enjoyable and the last one with the Golani Group of soldiers was particularly successful and the soldiers enjoyed interacting with the Synagogue members. We have been grateful to BNJC for permitting us to have reduced cost for the Friday night dinners.

We had a garden party tea which was attended by some fifty guests and we were fortunate with the weather which stayed dry although not as sunny as usual for the time of year.

We are sadly no nearer a resolution of the arrangements with the Hove Hebrew Congregation concerning funerals but sincerely hope this matter can be resolved to both parties' satisfaction.

Many Synagogue members have supported Friday morning vigils for the hostages and some have also done so during the weekly vigils at Palmeira Square. Rabbi Rader has conducted short prayers and addressed the group on several occasions.

There was a vigil held to mark six hundred day of the hostages captivity and six hundred yellow ribbons were placed on a willow bow frame. The entire bow was removed to the Synagogue where it proudly stands outside on the Synagogue wall.

Shortly we shall see the erection of the succah and there will be events enjoying the use of the same. We had a very large attendance for the Pesach Seder but it is possible that the Centre will close Novellino next year 's Pesach and not become kosher for Pesach.

Novellino is now being run under the supervision of Ryan, as the much-respected George left following a period of illness. We will be seeing less of Rabbi Matt Marks shortly as he moves onto a role within the United Synagogue but the family will continue to live on the site. We shall also be saying goodbye to Samuel, one of the Supervisors of Kashrus in the kitchen of Novellino as he is taking up a new appointment in Manchester.

The Synagogue would welcome more volunteers to assist with kiddush preparation and other shul activities. We are extremely grateful to the volunteers who give generously of their time and it is not taken by the Board for granted We are also anxious to recruit persons with financial expertise and company secretarial skills.

Suggestions have been made to leave the front gate of the Centre open, but the Board made strong representations supported by the CST to have it remain shut. At present this will remain the situation

but it will be under review in the future and this will depend upon the political situation changing.

The Middle Street Synagogue will continue to be available by appointment to persons interested in viewing it, but it is still only partly restored. The application to the National Lottery is well advanced. We have to thank Howard Hamilton for ensuring the work to date has ensured that the Synagogue is wind and water tight. It's 150th year anniversary is due shortly and this will be celebrated and the work to arrange the celebration is being organised by Michael Crook and Martyn and Michel Cooperman. Watch for further information!

We are fortunate to have such an experienced Rabbi and he and his wife are conscientious and interested in all activities. They are really good team players and often go far beyond the obligations of their roles. I am appreciative of their support at all times.

I am pleased to confirm the Synagogue is in good heart and going forward with optimism.

Book Review


Melting Point by Rachel Cockerell

his very unusual book tells the story of the foundation of the State of Israel largely through the tale of one family, the descendants of David Jochelman. the author's great-grandfather. The author has chosen not to put any of the story into her own words, however, relying entirely on contemporary accounts, press extracts, family diaries, letters and other sources. Each quotation is referenced, and the effect is guite dramatic, especially when we learn how momentous events, such as the Zionist Congresses and the Balfour Declaration, were reported across a wide range of newspapers, both in the UK and in the USA.

The story opens with Theodore Herzl, describing the effect he had on those he met in London, Vienna and Basel, with quotes from his own writings, and in particular his relationship with Israel Zangwill. There are extensive references to the lead up to and the proceedings of the First Zionist Congress in 1897 in Basel, and its aftermath. The objective of a Jewish state in Palestine was met with overwhelming approval, but little progress was made over the next few years.

The trail then takes in the pogroms in Kishinev in 1903 and then reverts back to the succession of Zionist Congresses from 1897 to 1901, including the fourth in London in 1900. The sixth Congress assembled



shortly after the Kishinev pogroms, and is described in detail. By this time the British Government were indicating that an extensive undeveloped tract of land in Uganda might be acceptable as an alternative to Palestine, and after heated debate, Congress agreed to send an Expedition there to assess the situation. However, even this did not meet with universal approval, and the idea was eventually abandoned.

By 1904, Herzl was seriously ill, and after his death in July of that year, Israel Zangwill became the leader of the Zionists at the 1905 Congress. He was willing to

entertain alternatives to Palestine, and formed his own organisation, the Jewish Territorial Organisation (ITO). Zangwill was an author and playwright, and travelled to New York, where his play "Melting Pot" about Jewish immigration to the US was very successful in 1909/10. However, by this time serious concerns were being raised about the vast numbers of Jewish immigrants arriving in the US, mainly in New York, and Jacob Schiff, a wealthy businessman proposed an alternative scheme for Jews to enter the US via Galveston in Texas.

This was the point at which David Jochelman became involved in the story. He had been born in Kyiv in 1869, but had left Russia with his second wife and moved to Berne in 1900. He was a delegate to several of the Zionist Congresses, and favoured the Uganda scheme initially. He was a powerful advocate of a Jewish state, and Israel Zangwill had invited him to return to Russia to help encourage Jews to go to Galveston. In fact, about 10,000 did take this route, and were then dispersed across the Mid-West, and as far as California.

The Galveston experiment lasted until May 1914, and soon after this the outbreak of the Great War in Europe prevented emigration for its duration. As we know, the British Government were then very involved in deciding the future of the lands in the Middle East which

had been under Ottoman control for many years. In November 1917 they issued the Balfour Declaration, and later took control of what was then called Palestine under the UN Mandate.

Much of the rest of the book relates the lives of Jochelman's son by his first wife, and two daughters by his second. The son lived mainly in New York, but the daughters came to London, living for many years in a large house in Brondesbury Park together with their husbands and a total of seven children. The story comes full circle after World War Two and the foundation of the State of Israel, with extensive contemporary guotes from David Ben Gurion, and others, including reports of the flood of refugees who left the State after Independence. Finally, one of the sisters. Sonia. and her family made aliyah in 1949/50, with her husband later becoming director of the Jabotinsky Institute, having worked with him in London over several years in the 1930s.

In deciding to approach this book in such an unusual way, Rachel Cockerell has enabled the reader to understand the origins of Zionism and the route to the creation of the State of Israel in a new, and to me entirely unexpected, way. Her work has attracted favourable comments from the likes of Simon Schama and Jonathan Freedland, and I found it a fascinating and rewarding read.

History

Jew's Hospital, Whitechapel Compiled by Gordon Franks

he following article appeared in the December 1819 issue of Gentleman's Magazine. It is reprinted verbatim.

The Jews' Hospital for aged Poor and the Education and Employment of Youth of both sexes, is situated in Mile End Road, on the South side, between White Horse Lane and Bancroft's Buildings.

It appears from the Report of Mr. J. Van Oven, that this Institution arose from the philanthropic exertions of Benjamin and Abraham Goldsmd, esgrs, who in 1795 commenced a collection among their friends for a fund for the benefit of the Jewish poor of that class denominated German Jews, which proved so success as to enable them in 1797 to purchase 22,000l, imperial three per cents. In 1806, after very mature deliberation, it was determined to establish an Hospital for the reception and support of the aged poor, as well as the education and industrious improvement of both sexes; 30,000l. were placed in trust as an inviolate fund for its maintenance, yielding 900l. per annum; and the freehold, now the Hospital, was completed, and furnished for the reception of five aged men and five aged women, ten boys and eight girls and opened June 20, 1807. An annexed freehold was also purchased for 2000l. for

the purpose of enlarging the building as soon as convenient.

By subsequent Benefactions and Subscriptions, the Managers have been enabled to increase their number of objects – there being now supported in the Establishment 40 boys, 26 girls and 12 aged persons, viz. 6 men and 6 women.

No aged person can be admitted who has not been resident in London ten years; nor youth whose parents have not been resident the same period.

The Boys are received at the age of about nine vears: and admitted must be able to read Hebrew. and those who add to this a knowledge of English reading are preferred. From their admission, to the age of fourteen, they are taught Reading, Writing, Arithmetic and other branches of useful learning. At fourteen they are bound apprentice to the Manufacturing Trades which are established and carried on upon the premises. There are at present two of these manufactories under the management of competent masters on of which is in the boot and shoe line, and the second is a mahogany-chair manufactory. The Girls are also taught reading, writing, and arithmetic, household work, and plain cooking, and at the age of fifteen are placed in respectable families as apprentices or

articled servants; and if at the age Institution as a reward.

Both Boys and Girls receive handsome encouragements in premiums to stimulate them to habits of industry; and the Boys who are apprenticed in the Establishment have certain tasks assigned them, which are so adjusted as to afford them opportunities of earning something considerable over and above what is required; threefourths of such overearnings are saved for them until their apprenticeships are expired, which serves as a little capital to begin the world with, and in most cases will be sufficient to provide tools and other necessaries, the remaining fourth being given to them for pocket money. The Lads who have commenced business since the completion of their term in the House, have turned out industrious characters, and promise to become useful and exemplary members of society. Several Girls have been already disposed of in the manner specified, fourteen of whom have received the aforesaid premium of five guineas.

The annexed view of the Hospital, from a drawing made in 1816, represents the building as it appeared previous to the late material alterations.

Since this view was taken, an addition has been made

to the Hospital, of a separate habitation for the Aged, where they are comfortably placed: and some very necessary enlargement of the Kitchen and other Offices has taken place. as well as a new Diningroom and a place for Divine Worship equally requisite; by which means, space is procured for the reception of many more Inmates. The irregular appearance of the front occasioned by these new erections, has, however, induced some friends of the Institution, to wish for

a further improvement in its aspect by the rebuilding and uniting the old with the new fronts and thus to make it uniform; this has been effected, and the Building now exhibits a handsome front, characteristic of its importance and descriptive of its purposes.

The interest which the Public, not only of the Jewish persuasion but of other descriptions, take in the welfare of this Establishment – seems to warrant a confidence that

the number of the Inmates of this well-directed effort of benevolence will shortly be considerably augmented. Annual Subscriptions from ne to five or ten guineas are taken, and even lower sums.

Gordon Franks notes while the article is not relevant to Brighton it details an important part of Jewish life in this county. It is not known if the writer was Jewish. If anyone has any information, please contact Gordon through the shul office.
